Editorial,

Dear Members,

It's almost a year now the *BOSLA newsletter* has come out. Nevertheless, efforts will be made to bring out the newsletter regularly twice a year from this issue onwards. In this issue an attempt has been made to understand what exactly Library 2.0 is all about and what the upcoming trends that are on our way.

The word 'Web 2.0' has amused many of us when first time it came into existence. Now it is the time for Library 2.0. Even conferences and workshops are being held on this concept. Wikipedia briefs Library 2.0 as a loosely defined model for a modernized form of library service that reflects a transition within the library world in the way that services are delivered to users. With Library 2.0, library services are constantly updated and re-evaluated to serve library users. It attempts to harness the library user in the design and implementation of library services by encouraging feedback and participation.

Its way back when Dr S R Ranganathan introduced the first law of library science -'Books are for Use'. The word 'Books' has been reinvented with terms such as Document, Information, Web and so on. It's a change or transformation of a concept into ongoing or upcoming concepts that are supported by new technologies such as web applications.

The days are gone where the user used to visit the library for desired information. Now the desired information is on their way by various tools and technologies that are easily and freely available on the Web. It is very clear from the technologies listed in Web 2.0 viz.,-RSS. Wikis, blogging, personalization, podcasting, streaming media, ratings, alerts, folksonomies. tagging, social networking software, and the rest - could be useful in an institute or community environment and could be introduced into the library system. It is a fact that many of these are already under use by individuals.

The Library 2.0 is nothing but, the level of integration and interoperability that is designed into the interface through library portal or intranet. There lies the real power to enhance the user experience. In order to take advantage of the new concept inherent in Library 2.0 is the imperative to not shy away from adding advanced functionality and features directly into the content. This would provide the context and workflow-oriented features that users will demand or are demanding already.

Web 2.0 vs. Library 2.0?

Identifying, procuring, organizing and disseminating conventional sources in which libraries involved since decades find themselves in challenging phase, probably because of the dramatic change in availability of various forms and formats of information in the recent past. These changes offer great opportunities for libraries to reach out far beyond the boundaries of their buildings and premises, and to engage an increasingly literate body of with information consumers at large in the network It is the libraries environment. and management who need to accept and adopt the changing technologies and to cope up with the user needs and demands. Now it is the libraries need to take proactive step to feed the customized information to the end user in anticipation by using web technologies.

In simple terms Library 2.0 is a concept of a new library service that is more towards information centric, geared towards the needs and expectations of today's library user irrespective of his location by using advanced web technologies and applications. In this vision, the library makes information available wherever and whenever the user requires it, and seeks to ensure that barriers to use and reuse are removed.

What are RSS, Wikis, Blogs, and Folksonomies?

RSS means "Real Simple Syndication" or "Rich Site Summary" an XML format for easily sharing content among different Web sites such as news headlines. RSS feeds are replacement tools of email alerts. It offers patrons library RSS feeds that gather alerts from databases and free websites to one platform that is accessible and available anytime, anywhere, RSS aggregators also support sharing and collaboration. One can share feeds with subscribe community and allow others to add their feeds. In this manner one can create a dynamic and participatory knowledge base rather than a "push" technology.

Wikis is a type of website that allows the visitors to add, remove, and sometimes edit the available content. It is a collaborative web page that enables users to edit its contents. A wiki can be used for collaborative projects such as research or teaching. Wiki platforms provide interfaces that make editing easy and support file uploading and sharing. One can use wiki to deliver library education classes or create communities of interest. There are many free wiki platforms are available (www.pbwiki.com). Depending on the purpose of wiki one can make it fully editable or provide viewing privileges only.

Blogs are Personal web pages which are regularly updated by their creators. They tend to look like diaries and are in reverse chronological order. In a blog one can instantly publish news, articles or any item of interest and receive feedback from the readers. One can use a library blog to discuss the latest innovations in the field, exchange comments about events or share project updates. There are many freely available blogging platforms today, (www.blogspot.com). To create a blog visit the site and follow the simple steps to have your own Blog.

Folksonomies are collaboratively generated, open-ended labeling systems that enable Internet users to categorize content such as Web pages, online photographs and others. Typically, folksonomies are Internet-based, although they are also used in other contexts. Aggregating the tags of many users creates a As folksonomies develop in folksonomy. Internet-mediated social environments, users can discover who used a given tag and see the other tags that this person has used. In this way, folksonomy users can discover the tag sets of another user who tends to interpret and tag content in a way that makes sense to them. The result can be a rewarding gain in the user's capacity to find related content.

What do the Librarians really need to do?

The Library 2.0 label reflects revolution more than evolution, which is believed that the new opportunities and the impending challenges. The library domain has repeatedly evolved to embrace new technologies and to adapt in line with changing expectations to survive with strong roots. However, it is our view that the current challenges are more subtle, more significant, and thus more disruptive than in the past.

For instance, Google provides an index to the web with free search facility. The search results are listed with links with a free full text access where ever available and applicable. It has series of similar tools and online services viz., Alerts, Blog search, Scholar, News and so on. The list is increasing continuously. All of them are free and designed as per the taste of end user. The service speed is so high that the information that is in process is delivered to the end users in anticipation.

Amazon provides a global catalogue of in print and out of print books; Flickr has enabled anyone to 'tag' their photos and use this 'metadata' to better enable sharing or personal rediscovery of resources. Netflix is effectively an online borrowing service for DVDs. Thus user expectations have moved far from imagination. Some librarians may perceive a threat from these commercial services providing, as they do, a more enticing user experience than the traditional library OPAC. In short, there is a sense that they can provide all the resources the user requires plus super slick fulfillment mechanisms.

However, in reality the growth of participation and the ability of people to find, and be enriched by, a wealth of experiences is to be welcomed. There is no reason why some of these ideas cannot be adopted by those libraries and librarians that are prepared to engage with these trends, and to deliver upon their historical core values in innovative new ways

Library 2.0 facilitates, invites and encourages a culture of participation from end users, drawing upon the perspectives and contributions of library staff, technology partners and the wider community by sharing their views on new sources they used elsewhere and the new ones to which they wish to access.

Professionals in Library and Information Science need to take lead role and proactive step to understand these new concepts and technologies to adopt in library systems and services so as to keep the user community always on their toes to attract their attention towards libraries.

Asiatic Library is India's first ISO-certified library, Industrialists pitch in for 204-yr-old society

The Asiatic Society of Mumbai has been awarded ISO certification - the first library in India to get it. Although the library is 204 years old, its managing committee felt the need to get international standardization to meet growing competition from the Internet.

"We want more young faces to come and use this historic library. It is free of cost and we have the best old and new books," said Arun Tikekar, president of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.

To get the new ISO 9001 certification under the American National Accreditation Board, every

employee underwent training under the Toyota Production System method, which helps streamlining processes - from better organizing the catalogue with colored tags to creating a calendar for housekeeping.

It was the idea of Sharad Gadgil, finance secretary of the society, to get the certification. "We approached the Narottam Saxena Foundation and they willingly funded the audit process, which cost around Rs 1 Lakh," he said. The process, carried out by Ace Management Consultants, took nine months to train every employee from the base level to the core group. Keen to assess what change the ISO certification has brought about, honorary secretary of the Asiatic Society, Vidya Venkatesan has decided carry out a survey to get feedback from everyday visitors. Ariandra Riera, a Spanish tourist, said, "This library has beautiful architecture and is exceptionally large as compared to the ones in Spain. An ISO certification will help get more people to use it, especially foreigners like me."

For now, the future of the library looks bright with the Tatas, Godrej's and Rajya Sabha MPs coming forward with funds. Rajya Sabha members Dr Alexandra and Shyaam Benegal have already sanctioned Rs 25 Lakhs and Rs 11 Lakhs for a fire fighting system and research centre respectively."
